Winter Workshops



Delightful, Diminutive, Teapots, Tom Benham reporting

The 2006 Winter Workshops is over and is now history, but what fond memories. . .

I was extremely lucky to have been in John Cogswell's class creating miniature teapots. I can't remember when I've enjoyed a workshop this much or have had the opportunity to work with a group of classmates who preformed at such a high level of craftsmanship. Each person's work was a real inspiration and joy to watch develop from simple sketches to cardboard models and then to the actual construction of the silver piece. There was an extremely wide variety of design ideas and all teapots were completed by the final evening making impressive display.

John focused on demonstrating his techniques for clipping and binding the silver parts together for soldering as well as how to construct special cradles for supporting the pieces above the fire bricks so that the assemblies could be evenly heated avoiding both hot spots and cool areas. I consider this workshop to have been a Master Class in Advanced Soldering. I think Delightful, Diminutive, Teapots was one of John Cogswell's finest workshops ever!



Trish McAleer Metal Corrugation and Surface Embellishment

Who got the "turkey award"? No-body! Imagine a class of fifteen students, all working with thin sharp metal for five days and not one person receiving Trish McAleeer's award for injury. Two of the items on her supply list were "gloves and band aids". Most students had both at the ready but amazingly we all survived intact. (Well, there was one student who set her sweater on fire but there wasn't an award for that.)

A statement on the cover page of Trish's book, Metal Corrugation:
Surface Embellishment and Element Formation for the Metalsmith, states, "Art is never created in a vacuum. It takes many creative minds and hands to explore a process and share in the possibilities. I believe art begets art." Her class, which had the most number of students at the workshop, was proof of that theory. Sharing of ideas, tools, resources and fun was the theme of the week.

We began by learning the fundamentals of corrugating metal. Most of us are probably still hearing Trish's mantra of "Anneal! Anneal! Anneal!" We progressed to hand working, patterning, crimping, die forming and use of the hydraulic press. Toward the end of the week we learned about finer embellishments and how to incorporate the elements we made. Each student made numerous shapes and forms to be used in jewelry or as samples.

Trish started each day with wellorganized lectures and demonstrations. For most workshops that I have taken, I type my notes soon after returning home because they are disjointed. For example, something that happened on day five completed the instruction for day one, etc. Trish's instruction was precise and sequential, allowing me to skip that chore!

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Disability Alternatives

Phil London's dream is coming true, the DAI project is finally up and running!

DAI, with its goal of "teaching the art of jewelry making to people with disabilities and giving these persons the opportunity to make jewelry as a career, thus giving them more employability skills". The DAI project is currently running two sessions, one on Mondays and the other on Fridays, both are at the Arts Center in St. Petersburg in the FSG, classroom. Of the group that meets on Mondays, there are currently four students enrolled. Included in this group is Lonnie Hazelwood who is Native American, his name in his native tongue is "Saygoyewatah", which means storyteller. He is in charge of the Alliance For Artists and the Tampa Bay Alliance for Artists with Disabilities. As Phil is teaching the art of jewelry making to Lon and his group, Lon is also, teaching and honoring the DAI group in the ways and traditions of the Native Americans. Lon, who is from the "Turtle Clan", has honored Phil as the "Leader and Wise Elder of the DAI group". He gave Phil a Turtle Necklace and offered up a Native American prayer of thanks for Phil and also one for each of the volunteers there. He explained that it is a Native American tradition to honor someone or some group, who has honored or helped you. This tradition highlights the value of bonding and working together in a community. One is reminded that he or she is not alone in life and that people will help in the hard times and provide acknowledgment in the good times. It is also their tradition to honor the leader or the elder of the group first. This gesture was so meaningful and beautiful it almost brought tears to my eyes and I'm sure it would have made the hairs on your arm stand-up, as it did mine, just to witness this event. To Lon, Wado (thank-you in Cherokee). And to Phil and DAI, Good luck and continue the great work!

You probably know all about Disability Alternatives a not-for-profit organization teaching individuals with a physical disability how to make jewelry, It started with stroke victims, with the loss of or partial loss of one hand, there has been one session at the Art Center in St. Petersburg, FI as a result of that we are now trying to reach out to those that are legally blind. We have taken our beginners jewelry manual and are having it translated into Braille, including the drawings which are being done By Mary Kline a well known fine artist. Who coincidentally was learning how to write in Braille, She is all excited with this new project, To the best of my knowledge this has never been done before.
